# 13 sign up for "water" kits SCWD Special Project 2015-16

Ewing Row Modeling Project Chair

At the regular SCWD Sunday meet on September 13, 2015, a total of 13 signed up for the 2015-2016 Modeling Project. Actually it was only 12 individuals because one person signed up for both an HO and an N-scale kit.

If there is a theme this year, it is water. There are only two "have to do's" for the project: 1. Water must be modeled, and 2. participants must adhere to the diorama size requirements.

The kit includes all you need to scenic a 144-square inch base for HO scale or 72 square inches for N, including a suitable sized piece of pink insulation that is 1.5 inches thick. However, to make it even easier any base is acceptable.

Also, if you want, you may hand lay track with material provided: ties and Code 83 weathered rail. However, any type of track -- flex or sectional -- is acceptable.

Material for modeling water is provided. It is acrylic glazing liquid and plaster cloth. Acrylic glazing liquid is the same material that Woodland Sceinics has in it water-making kits. The plaster cloth is supplied to make a water-tight base for pouring the acrylic glazing liquid. Like real water, it will run to the lowest point and through many of the non-watertight bases you might choose. Complete directions for modeling water will be part of the kit. The cost of the kit is \$10.00.

Participants are free to use any materials they desire. The only Modeling Project musts are: You must model water and you must have your base be within the size limits.

There will be more opportunities to sign up for the Modeling Project. Contact me at <a href="mailto:rxxing2@att.net">rxxing2@att.net</a> to receive your kit at the October meet or sign up at the October meet; you'll receive your kit in November. So whether you choose to build a diorama for display or incorporate your efforts into a layout, this year's modeling project is for you.

October Model Contest



SCWD Board of Directors Meeting Minutes June 8, 2015

August 10, 2015

The Board of Directors meeting for the 2015-2016 South Central Wisconsin Division, Midwest Region, National Model Railroad Association was called to order at 7:06 p.m. on August 10, 2015 by Superintendent Bob McGeever. He declared a quorum present. In attendance were McGeever, Mike Vivion,

Alan Paine, John Haverberg, Phil Berry, Phil Hottmann and Bill Clancy.

A motion was made by Phil Hottmann, seconded by Bill Clancy and approved by the Board to accept the minutes of the 6/10/2015 Board Meeting as presented.

Phil Berry presented both June and July paymaster reports with the July report being the last in fiscal year 2014-2015. A motion was made by Mike, seconded by Bill and approved by the Board to accept the reports as presented. Phil B. then presented budget projections for 2015-2016 fiscal year along with actual yearly budget items from 2008 through 2014-2015. Bottom line showed SCWD to be in good budget shape. A motion was made by Bill, seconded by Phil H. and approved to accept the proposed budget as presented.

#### **Committee Reports:**

Bad Order: Paul Mangan has been an excellent editor for many years. Bob suggested that the BOD should look into the possibility of finding a SCWD member willing to give Paul relief and take over for Paul in the near future.

Club Liaison: Alan said the first area up coming Club show will be in Monroe 26&27<sup>th</sup> of September.

Clinics: Bob indicated that it should be possible to stream digital presentations on-line at the new Zor Temple meeting venue.

Contests: See Bad Order for monthly modeling and photo contest subjects.

Modeling Project: Bob handed out a written proposal for the 2015-2016 Modeling Project by Ewing Row. The Project is to create a railroad diorama that must include model water. Ewing is wiling to put together kits of model material to sell for \$10. There will be size restrictions for both HO and N scale dioramas by adults. A parallel contest for the youth group to scenic their T-trak modules is proposed. Ewing's proposal included rules, guidelines, and prizes. He also prepared a comparison of the last eight years of special projects with the subject and signed up and actually completed projects. A motion was made by Biil, seconded by Phil H. and approved by the Board to go ahead with Ewing's proposal.

Door Prizes: Statement budget amount available for door prizes will be provided to Bill Weber for the fiscal year by Phil B.

Layout Tours: Phil H. is starting to make contacts for coming year. Board discussed possibility to limiting # of tours with the possible exception of the May 2016 meeting where SCWD will be hosting the Rockford Division joint meeting plus also hosting the NMRA Midwest Region Board of Directors meeting on the morning of our joint meeting. Any outdoor G-scale layouts should be during good weather. Perhaps there should be no tours scheduled for Super Bowl Sunday in February.

Picnic: 2015 picnic at Little Amerricka was a success with youth group able to visit the shops before the full park opened. Four steam engines pulled passenger trains during the afternoon. Catering by Hy-Vee worked out well, again. SCWD members and guest attendance was less than the 134 signed up but still exceeded 100.

Magazine SCWD Meeting Publicity: John indicated that the SCWD meetings have been submitted to the five hobby publications through the December meeting and the 2016 Rail Show to the State of Wisconsin Travel Wisconsin web site.

Rail School: Mike suggested that flyers be prepared to promote the January Rail School and distributed to various sites in addition to advertising in the newspaper. There will be enough money in the budget to cover this cost.

Youth Group: The youth group will be touring the Illinois Railway Museum in Union, Ill. on Sept. 5<sup>th</sup>. Board discussed the need to transport old HO layout(s) to the new meeting venue.

#### Old Business:

Bob re-formatted and sent out the SCWD by-laws. The Board members should review and be prepared to recommend changes/updates to be included in the Red Book update scheduled to go to printing for late this calendar year.

Bob reminded Board members to get their Red Book Opt in Form filled out, signed and mailed in BY REGULAR MAIL. Paul needs by no later than October 27, 2015.

#### New Business:

Bob will be doing a dress rehearsal of multi-media equipment on Monday, 8/24, at the Zor Temple. Let Bob know of special requests you might have.

Possible new multi-media items to be purchased include a new Blue-ray player (+/- \$70) and an HDMI mixer box (\$30-\$50). Zor Temple has a large screen display monitor we hope to use.

Motion by Bill, seconded by Phil and approved to adjourn at 8:47 pm.

In 2016 the Central Indiana Division of the MWR will host the High Ball to Indy NMRA National convention.





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



## **NMRA Directors and Officers**

The NMRA Board recognized the newly elected and reelected members: Peter Youngblood, MMR (North America At Large Director), Mike Bartlett (Pacific District Director), Joe Gelmini, MMR (Eastern District Director). It also recognized newly elected Vice President – Administration Clark Kooning, HLM, MMR and Vice President – Special Projects Gerry Leone, HLM, and MMR who took office at the General Membership Meeting on Thursday evening at the recent NMRA Convention in Portland.

Additionally, the Board thanked outgoing Vice President – Administration Dave Thornton for his many contributions and years of service. The Board also named Pete Magoun, MMR, as new Lead Director.

# NMRA adopting standards for Layout Command Control

The National Model Railroad Association (NMRA) Board of Directors has agreed to adopt standards for Layout Commands Control (LCC), formerly known as NMRANet. LCC is an operating system protocol, which will work hand-in-hand with Digital Command Control (DCC), handling all non-motive power related functions on a model railroad layout, such as signaling, telephone, and automation. In essence, LCC is DCC for the rest of your layout. LCC was developed over the past several years by the Open LCB Group – a large group of volunteers with expertise in electronics, networking, programming, and model railroading similar to the group that developed Java Model Railroad Interface (JMRI). The final draft of the LCC protocols and the specification documents have been published for comment on the NMRA's website. Look for an article describing all of the benefits of LCC in a future issue of the NMRA Magazine.

## FRA: most railroads will miss PTC

## deadline

WASHINGTON, D.C. - The Federal Railroad Administration (FRA) has sent its Status of Positive Train Control Implementation report to Congress. The report is mandated by the House of Representatives Appropriations Committee and shows that after seven years and significant assistance from FRA, most railroads will miss the Dec. 31, 2015 positive train control (PTC) implementation deadline that Congress established in 2008.

"Positive Train Control is the most significant advancement in rail safety technology in more than a century. Simply put: it prevents accidents and saves lives, which is exactly what we seek to do at The Department of Transportation every single day. We will continue to do everything in our power to help railroads install this technology," U.S. Transportation Secretary Anthony Foxx said.

The National Transportation Safety Board (NTSB) began calling for train control systems like PTC in 1969, and FRA was involved in establishing PTC standards with stakeholders for more than a decade before the 2008 mandate. Three years before Congress passed the PTC mandate, FRA issued its final rule that established uniform PTC standards for railroads willing to voluntarily install the technology.

PTC prevents train-to-train collisions, over-speed derailments, incursions into established work zone limits and a train going to the wrong track because a switch was left in the wrong position.

In 2008, Congress passed the Rail Safety Improvement Act (RSIA), requiring all Class I railroads transporting poisonous-by-inhalation hazardous (PIH) or toxic-by-inhalation hazardous (TIH) materials and all railroads providing passenger service to implement Positive Train Control by Dec. 31, 2015.

## In the Station:

I hope that you were all able to find the new meet location on the west side of Madison and were able to avoid the Madison Iron Man and Woman competition. Our SCWD moving crew gathered on Sunday the 20<sup>th</sup> to move stuff from the storage locker over to the ZOR Shrine temple for the youth group meeting. We stuck around to watch Paul Balfe conduct a clinic on scenery and ballasting track.

The kids really appreciated Paul's clinic as did Steve Brist who by the way is doing a wonderful job of leadership for our youth group. It would be great to see more members sign up and do clinics for these young modelers. After all, this is the future of our hobby so let's pass it on. See you by the Rails
